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### **PERSPECTIVE**

This guide focuses on helping us understand the changes in our culture—the world in which we live and interact with people through daily conversations.

Taking a love that existed before time and making it understood today is no small order.

As imperfect followers of Jesus who desire to share His love with others, we have learned there isn't a magic formula for doing ministry. Everyone is different and on their own unique journey. This is why the church must live and work in a new way.

Let this serve as a guide to impacting the lives of people in the city today.

### GO MAKE DISCIPLES

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Then Jesus came to them and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." (Matthew 28:18-20 NIV)

### JESUS



Our churches and specialized ministries have functioned like greenhouses.

In the greenhouse you have similar routines and controlled environments - receiving about the same social, cultural, and spiritual inputs at about the same time. This has produced the same kind of product - good flowers!

And that is a very good thing!

But today's reality can't compare to a greenhouse.



The winds of this world influence understanding. Negative influences charm and distract. In our cities the environmental system exists way beyond our control. Chaos rules. People are exposed to influences from every angle, with no central support network to guide them.

We cannot combat the wind, the rain or the wildlife in these wild and open fields. We must instead learn from those who thrive in chaos...

We need new capacity and skill to communicate the gospel through meaningful conversations – in the open, chaotic fields of our day.

### SCATTERING SEEDS

The humble dandelion releases a hundred seeds.

They are scattered on the wind, carried by animals, eaten by pests. The dandelion expects this, and lives in the hope that a few catch and take root. Even two seeds that grow doubles the number of new dandelions able to repeat the process once again.

And in this way, slowly but surely, it fills the field.

We need to learn to be like the dandelion...

### SOME GROW, SOME DON'T

Our role as followers of Jesus is to spread as many seeds as we can. To open dialogue with as many new and different people as we can, in the hope that a few catch. We can learn from the dandelion.

We spread seeds. It's God's role to see that they grow. Every seed that flies is a conversation. Some will land, others won't. And that's okay.

Because the more conversations we have, the more seeds will grow.



The city of today is a landscape full of diversity, opinions, and beliefs.

The people who share our sidewalks come from many backgrounds and cultural makeups.

All who live alongside us are unique. An understanding of them is critical to our mission to share the love of Jesus in this 'field.' We must know them, as we seek to make Jesus known.

## EVERYONE IS ON A JOURNEY

In every conversation, in every interaction, we must know who we are talking to and be considerate of their beliefs and their relationship to Jesus (if any), or to Christians and religion in general. From this starting point we are able to better share our story and the story of Jesus to those in the city.

However, we must respect the journey and not simply determine how I can move someone along a spiritual path.

#### DEAR CHRISTIAN, I AM NOT LOST



"Most people in this wonderful world we share would agree that a good, purposeful life is something to strive for. How we choose to find that purpose can come in many forms. Everyone is out there finding their way. But the vast majority would not consider themselves lost on this journey. Neither should you.

"To reach me first you have to know me. To know me, you have to understand my journey. To truly understand, you have to surrender your desire to help and start to listen. To truly listen, you have to meet me where I am, around what matters to me. And you might be surprised by how much we have in common.

"We care about the same things. About creating a better, more peaceful world for everybody. About providing a safe, healthy and fun environment for our children. About being kind, caring and open-minded to our neighbors. These are beliefs we share. This is the common ground where we can meet.

"I also believe you should navigate this world with the belief that everyone knows something you don't. That you can learn something from every interaction. That everyone can help you on your journey as much as you can help them. Look at the world through this lens and listen, understanding and shared purpose will become second nature.

"Humbly, I think we all believe in something. That none of us are really lost, we are just finding our way. For many, including myself, there is no expected destination. The journey is the way. Meet me on it and who knows where we might travel together."

#### SEVEN PERSONAS: EVERYONE BELIEVES

Jen is a 43-year-old Asian-American female.

She displays Christian values and abides by the golden rule. She self-identifies as Non-Christian and is quite content with her spiritual viewpoint. She has had exposure to many denominations of Christianity but rejects them all. She believes that we are created by a higher power of some sort, but that is where any similarities end. She wants nothing to do with Christianity or Christians.

#### IN JEN'S WORDS

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"Most religious people or people of faith are so entrenched with their beliefs that they don't really want to hear any counter arguments. They are not open to new ideas. This sort of repels people who approach with an open and logical mind."

He is satisfied with his life outlook and desires to make the world a better place. He will gladly engage in conversation about faith and purpose but not without a bit of an internal eye roll.

## I'M DANIELLE (ANXIOUS)



Danielle is a multi-ethnic 24-year-old female who self-identifies as a curious Non-Christian and displays Christian values, or follows the golden rule in what she deems important in life.

She occasionally experiences anxiety and has sought many avenues to alleviate this including psychotherapy, Kundalini Yoga, and more. She believes in a higher power but has little context to what that means in her life. She is open and searching, and would engage with a Christian organization to help build the community and discuss purpose and spirituality—if there was no initial effort to convert her and she felt she would not be judged.

### I'M AARÓN (EXPLORER)



Aarón is a 24-year-old Hispanic male who was raised in a Catholic household in a predominantly Catholic, urban community.

He never really questioned his faith until attending a larger Middle School where he was exposed to new religions and beliefs. Once out of school, he began to explore other spiritual practices and his purpose in life. He does believe in a Higher Power or Higher Powers and is relatively comfortable with his spirituality but at times faces the fear of "What if Christianity is the way?". He would be completely open to having a conversation about spirituality with "open-minded" Christians.

# I'M CRYSTAL (DISILLUSIONED)



Crystal is a 36-year-old African-American female who became increasingly disillusioned by seeing the use of religion as a method of subjugation in and around her experiences with the "Black Church."

She agrees with the principles of Christianity but sees profiteering and hypocrisy as a huge issue in the modern-day church - particularly mega-churches. Provided there was no initial effort to "convert her", she would engage with Christian organizations to help build the community and discuss purpose and spirituality.

### IN CRYSTAL'S WORDS

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"To me, religion is a man-made construction to control the populace. Unfortunately, it uses the faith and spirituality of the people to manipulate them for monetary, land, and power advancements. Faith is something you believe in, not something you are told to believe in."

# I'M WES (INQUISITIVE FOLLOWER)



Wes is a 33-year-old Caucasian male who is a recent convert to Christianity.

Though his parents weren't religious, he had some exposure to Christianity through his sister who would take him to a Baptist church as a child. He never really became actively involved in Christianity until a few years ago. He was struggling with addiction, and his marriage was in jeopardy until his wife's colleague introduced them both to a faithbased recovery program. He credits Christianity with saving both his life and his marriage but is not sure that it is the only path to salvation.

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"I do believe there is a God. I believe I was created by God and I can communicate with Him through prayer and listen to His words. At times, I feel that I am disappointed with myself when I fail to reach the target."



- How do we help faithful followers of Jesus discover how they can grow in their faith and uniquely impact the lives of others?


**HOW DO WE BEGIN?**

# THE ART IN ANY CONVERSATION

The art in any conversation is about how people find connection. The exchange demands that each listen, respect and understand the other. If we want to find common ground we must first listen and understand.

**COMMON GROUND** 

#### HOW LOVE RESPONDS -THE POSTURE WE WANT TO DEMONSTRATE

#### NO MATTER WHAT TOOLS WE USE OR STRATEGIES WE EMPLOY...

- BE PRESENT AND LISTEN follow the conversation, not your agenda. Ask questions. Listen long. Come alongside.
  - 2 FIND COMMON GROUND build a relational bridge, not a spiritual chasm. What do you mutually care about?
- WALK IN THEIR SHOES understand their story not your conclusion. Empathize! You may not understand them and could come to the wrong conclusion.
  - TALK LIKE A REAL PERSON use words meant for people not for the pews. In the pool of conversation, Christian dogma or religious words can be like an annoying cannonball.
- 5 CREATE A BETTER STORY share your faith as you care for the city don't just count conversations.


# HOW DO WE SHARE THE GOSPEL TODAY?
